"First of all, we are so touched by the idea of a memorial garden in our brother's name. Everyone is finding a way to help to create this beautiful and functional area of GROW-HUB. John would have loved being right in the middle of all the digging and planting. We hope everyone can feel at home to relax, smell the flowers and enjoy the moment here."

They continued the conversation by saying this: "Outside of GROW-HUB, John Bean enjoyed time visiting at his family's homes while sharing his vast knowledge of plants and a passion with their yard projects while also offering to help neighbors. He enjoyed going to the beach, riding bike trails, visiting parks and historic sites. John was a big fan of sci-fi movies and classic horror films, and of course, he was a 'trekie'. John always loved a good cookout with burgers or steaks, especially after a good time swimming in the lake or in waves at the beach. But John really enjoyed just hanging out and sharing laughs with family and friends."

John Edward Bean was fifty-three years old at the time of his unexpected death on December 9, 2019. John spent his entire life in Gainesville. Even though he had developmental disabilities, he never allowed them to stand in the way of accomplishing his dreams and goals. John was a quiet man, and he did not say much. However, what he did say was very meaningful, and he liked to tell jokes. He loved sports, and he especially loved the Gators. He loved working at GROW-HUB because it is a quiet and peaceful place. He loved interacting with the nature that is there. The memorial garden will be a living reminder of John and what an impact he had on all of us here at GROW-HUB.

I also keep up with the signage at GROW-HUB. I work there eight hours a week. Thankfully, the corona virus has not stopped me from working at GROW-HUB.

My name is Crystal Taylor, and I have been at GROW-HUB since February 2020. I found out about GROW-HUB when I taught at the Growing Educational Training Program at the Farm to School to Work Hub. GROW-HUB provides such a meaningful and wonderful service to



the community. I am responsible for helping care for the plants, assisting customers, and providing instruction to workers and volunteers. Because of the virus, we have not been able to work as much as we would like to work. Fortunately, due to the open-air environment and large open spaces, GROW-HUB has been able to remain open to the public for sales. We have adjusted our operating procedures to include thorough sanitizing of restrooms, buildings, carts, and tools. We have been completing sales transactions with a no-touch system. We are taking card numbers verbally, and we have a drop jar for the customers who are paying with cash. We are maintaining proper social distancing from customers, staff, and volunteers. I usually work at GROW-HUB fourteen hours per week. As revenue increases, we will be able to hire more individuals from the community. I think that a big sign on East University Avenue would help increase the customers. There are a lot of people who do not know about GROW-HUB. My hobbies outside of GROW-HUB include gardening and being a mother to my two-year-old. I am originally from Gainesville, and currently living in Micanopy.
